## CSU Extension hosts annual plant sale

Every year at about this time, the CSU Extension and Gilpin County Master Gardeners host their annual plant sale at the Gilpin Community Center Barn, 230 Norton Drive. Gardening in the short growing season of the mountains can be difficult, fraught with unique challenges best left to those willing to overcome them through proper research and devotion. People willing to make

the effort are abundantly rewarded with vivid splashes of color on their property as well as homegrown vegetables and herbs.

It was wise to get there early for the best selection. Table loads of native plants were available that thrive in our high elevation environment. Mountain-hardy perennial wildflowers such as Colorado blue columbine, blanket flower, blue flax, black-eyed Susan, and Rocky Mountain penstemon were good options. I've had some luck with penstemon in the past so


### Responsible gardening

I purchased three of those along with two lodgepole lupines to occupy a few bare spots in my flower bed. Each customer was allowed to buy five plants or shrubs.

Ziobro offers a wide variety of jellies and jams to spread on your toast alongside your egg breakfast. Some of the more interesting choices include: apricot pineapple sunshine jam, chokecherry jam, twin berry jalepeño jam, cucumber lime marmalade, orange wild blueberry marmalade, brandied
