The girls basketball team, cheerleaders, and fans lined the Gilpin Boys Varsity Basketball Team's entry to the hardwood on Thursday, January 19. They, along with the rest of the hometown fans in the bleachers, had come to offer support and cheer on their team.

Up against the Longmont Christian

Warriors, while feeling each other out, the teams battled through the first quarter to an 11-8 score with the Warriors ahead. Down but determined, the Eagles' offense came alive in the second quarter, hitting their shots and recording 15 points. Score at halftime: Longmont Christian 25, Gilpin 23.

As close a game as could be hoped for, the teams went back and forth sinking buckets and contesting the basket-

ball. In the end, the Eagles would fall behind five more points in the third quarter and another three in the fourth. Final score: Longmont Christian 55, Gilpin 45.

Trey Lindberg led the Eagles in scoring with 19 points. Six of his 19 points came from 3-pointers. Included in his totals were five rebounds and two steals. Lane Willis scored 12 points on six for eight shooting and a 75% average. He was also a monster on the boards hauling down nine offensive rebounds and nine defensive rebounds.

Ezra Williams contributed six rebounds and Ellis Lopez five.

Coach Lisa Bolter shared after the disappointing loss, "We play in a tough league – three of the teams in our league advanced to regionals. Our team is progressing every day despite a few setbacks along the way. The effort is there, for sure."

The boys' schedule is the same as the girls' (see page 5 for the next 10 days of school schedules for Nederland and Gilpin) with four home games remaining.

The Eagles applied relentless pressure to the Warriors in the third quarter. Decidedly overmatched, Longmont Christian's offensive playbook was limited. Mostly, their point guard would bring the ball up the court and pass it into the corner. Once there, the Eagles would apply a trap by double teaming that player which often resulted in a turnover, errant pass, or bad shot. One of the girls' mottos instilled by their coach is, "When you see their back, attack." Although not playing as tight as they might have against a better opponent, the Eagles still poured in 17 more points. Score after three quarters: Gilpin 38, Longmont Christian 4.

With the game well in hand, the coach was able to rest his starters and afford his younger players some valuable experience. Final score: Gilpin 42, Longmont Christian 8.

Kailey Starkey led all scorers with 10 points on five for ten shooting and a 50% average. Sophomore Annabelle Aloel did a solid job of clearing the boards, registering 10 rebounds. Skyley and Faith Ramsey each had five steals and Elise Vincent four. In a well-balanced effort, all nine of Gilpin's girls scored points.

Since their game versus the Warriors, the Eagles added another victory against Clear Creek two days later by a score of 59-6. The girls' record now stands at 7-2. They are 3-0 in league play and undefeated at home, winning six straight. Coach Jeff Schuessler foresees that, "We have a really good chance of going to regionals," but warns, "To guarantee a spot, we have to win the district."

The Lady Eagles' next home games are on January 31 against Denver Christian, February 2 against Heritage Christian, February 6 against Kiowa, and on February 11 versus North Park.
