The Gilpin Girls' Varsity Basketball Team didn't lose a single game in Gilpin County this year, going 11-0 at home. Their 16-4 overall record was the best in their district which translated into a #1 seed at the 2A District 7 Basketball Tournament at Dakota Ridge High School in Littleton February 24.

Following a first round bye, Gilpin's game against the Golden View Classical Academy Sentinels was merely a warmup for the next round. Dominating every aspect of the contest, the Eagles ended up winning by a score of 53-11. Freshman Elise Vincent was named Player of the Game with 11 points that included two 3-pointers. The statistic that stood out most was 21 steals; every member of the Eagles squad took the ball away from the Sentinels at least once.

The next day they would square off against the #2 ranked Denver Christian Thunder for the championship. The girls had faced the Thunder earlier in the year and were able to secure a 57-54 victory in Gilpin. Coach Jeff Schuessler called it "the best played game they participated in all year." Setting a goal at the beginning of the season of winning the District Championship, the Eagles would have to be in top form against a tough opponent in order to prevail.

The first quarter was far from their best, finding themselves down by a score of 16-6 at its conclusion. The Eagles buckled down defensively in the second and started hitting their shots. Outscoring Denver Christian 17-4 in that period, they took a 23-20
