Seven years ago, paramedic Steve Henry began holding bull riding events to raise money for first responders who sacrificed their lives in the line of duty. His nonprofit organization, Buck for the Badge, has distributed over \$250,000 to the loved ones left behind to help during a devastating and often financially difficult time.

Held on September 9 in conjunction with First Responders Day at Gilpin County Fairgrounds, the Fight for Life helicopter and emergency response vehicles were on hand for close inspection and their operators available for questions. Kids seemed particularly fascinated by the fire trucks. Some pulled pork barbeque caught my eye and nostrils as I passed through the vendors' stands. I couldn't help but wonder if the placement of the tent between the Democrats' tent and Republicans' tent was intentionally symbolic, a means of keeping the peace, or coincidental.







A dazzling display of horsemanship hanging off the front, side, and back whizzed by thrilled onlookers.


The bulls for Buck for the Badge were supplied by Ford Rodeo Ranch,
